A report found there were over 190 fatal injuries, adding to the unfortunate event. An estimated number of 100,000 attendees were present, but there was no security to control the crowd. The government has stated, 'there was no traffic or crowd control, and the cause for this was that people did not abide by the government rules.' Families who have lost loved ones are now in despair and grief-stricken.





## **SHAKEN ITALY**

Italy was hit by a shocking earthquake with a magnitude of 5.7 on the Richter scale. It was not only felt across the country, but the impact reached neighbouring countries, as far as Croatia. The Vatican City reported the termers, as did Bologna. The center of the quake was in the Adriatic Sea, 26km from Semigallia province of Ancona. The earthquake started around 11 AM and lasted for one minute.

Aftershocks were still being felt across the country. No loss of life has been reported and no serious damage was found to any buildings. This is a stark difference to the 4000 deaths from the 1980 earthquake Italy once endured. Thankfully, no deaths were reported; Italy will now be on the mend to fix the remaining damage.
